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SAFETY:

Changing clocks and batteries in smoke and CO detectors

Invitation Theft – are you a potential victim?

Councillor Lee wishes to share his own experience with his constituents as it may have happened to you also. He left my cars unlocked one night, and they were both ransacked in the middle of the night.

Thieves are striking it rich in our neighbourhoods by preying on absent-minded or careless homeowners who forget to lock their cars. Innocently enough, an unlocked car is like an invitation to help yourself to the "all you can take" buffet of your car's contents. These prowlers are looking for easy targets and will definitely take anything of value left in your unlocked car. Prevention is better than sorrow – lock your car doors.

Follow these easy steps and be proactive in guarding your property and vehicle. Before nightfall, take a moment each day and check that your car is locked and that any valuable items are placed out of sight. As well, ensure that all your house doors and windows are anchored shut. If you can, install a motion light detector at all entrances.

Halloween Safety Tips:

Halloween is lots of fun for kids, mostly because it involves getting dressed up and eating candy. There's more to Halloween than trick-or-treating and the Toronto Police Service would like to remind everyone of the need for safety this Halloween.

Some things you may not think of include costume safety, candy cautions, trick-or-treat best practices and driver safety. Below are some of the things about which the Toronto Police Service would like to remind everyone.

- 1) Put strips of reflective tape on the front and back of the costumes to make them more visible to drivers.
- 2) Your child's costume shouldn't drag on the ground, making it too easy to trip over. Shoes should be well-fitting and sturdy.
- 3) Don't allow children to carry sharp objects. Swords, knives, and any other accessories should be made of soft, flexible material.
- 4) If your child wears a mask, make sure it fits securely and has eyeholes large enough

so that he or she can see.

- 5) Ensure treat bags are light-colored for easy visibility. Decorate them with reflective tape (you can find it in dollar, hardware, bicycle, or sporting goods stores).
- 6) No child should go trick-or-treating alone. Always accompany your younger children; older children can go in groups.
- 7) Allow children to go trick-or-treating early but avoid the evening rush hour. It's harder for motorists to see clearly in the dark than when there is still daylight.
- 8) Give children specific neighbourhood boundaries for trick-or-treating. Set a firm curfew for your children.
- 9) Remind children to walk on sidewalks and be cautious when crossing streets.
- 10) Tell children to only go to homes and neighbors they know and only to houses with lights on.
- 11) Tell children to turn down all invitations to enter homes. Period.
- 12) Tell children to avoid even normally friendly neighborhood dogs, who can be startled by kids they know who are dressed in unfamiliar costumes.
- 13) Drivers: remember children may be preoccupied with trick-or-treating and may not be paying attention to the rules of the road. Keep vehicle speeds at or below the posted limits, and scan the road for children attempting to cross streets mid-block.

HOUSEKEEPING:

Catch up on keeping catch basins clear of debris

Catch basins are an integral part of Toronto's storm water management system. In our area, these grates along the side of the road carry rain water and melting snow and ice away from our homes and directly into local rivers and streams, thus reducing the risk of flooding to our properties. This is why it is important that we all do our part to keep catch basins clear of debris.

Now that autumn is upon us, the leaves are changing colour from green to magnificent shades of red, yellow and orange. As we all know, this brilliant display of colour is temporary because the leaves eventually fall from the trees to the ground. This creates a problem because the leaves can block the catch basins that are so important to preventing flooding in our communities. But you can help reduce this problem!

Please take the time to clear catch basins in front of your property from debris such as fallen leaves. Also clear your window wells and possible catch basins on your property

as well if you have a catch basin on your property. City waste management crews will collect leaves on garbage collection days until December. For more information, go to http://tinyurl.com/qbp3yta.

In the winter months, the city's snow clearing efforts result in snow covering catch basins after very heavy snowfall. Clearing catch basins of snow and ice is also important during the colder months to prevent flooding in the spring when melting occurs.
